

PHILLY FUN & FRESH IDEAS: CCLS STAFF AT ALA 2025!

The Friends of the Chester County Library generously funded continuing education this year, sending 22 CCLS staff members to the American Library Association's Annual Conference in Philadelphia. Some attended the full conference, others for a day, and all gained valuable insights from sessions on artificial intelligence, branding, cataloging, censorship, community engagement, inclusive libraries, gaming, literacy, programming, and staff support. Staff also attended keynote talks (including George Takei and Carla Hayden) and explored the extensive exhibit hall. All graciously thanked the Friends for the opportunity and shared highlights:

Stephanie Sharon-Missanelli shares four highlights from this year's Digipalooza conference, "Libraries, Readers, and the Future We're Building Together."


- Flexible access models can help librarians lower costs, serve patrons faster, and even build new collections (like world languages).

WHAT THE TECH? A ROBOT ARM!

The Friends helped fund our new Robot Arm in the Jacobs Technology Center (JTC). Built from the ground up by JTC staff member, Remy Way, the arm is fully open-sourced and 3D-printed—meaning we can enhance it and even print replacement parts in the future.

FRIENDS FALL BOOK SALE OCTOBER 3, 4 & 5

Our next Book Sale is scheduled for October 3 - 5. Recent bestsellers and books in a variety of subjects including history, music, art, religion, romance, science, humor, sports, gardening, and crafts will be available for purchase at bargain prices. Music and movie CDs and DVDs are priced at \$0.50 each. Check out our Specials Room for book sets for all ages, including *Percy Jackson & the Olympians*, Roald Dahl collections, and The Daily Stoic. There's also several biographies, and a collection of works by Robert Louis Stevenson. All of these are perfect for holiday gifting! (Please note: We accept cash, checks, PayPal, or Venmo. We don't accept credit cards.)

The sale starts on Friday, Oct. 3 from 6:00 to 8:30 p.m. for members of the Friends of the Chester County Library. All Friday night attendees must have a current membership before they get into line outside the Struble Room. Place-saving using boxes, crates, etc. is not allowed.

Memberships start at \$15 for an individual and \$20 per household and can be purchased in advance by mailing in the membership form (available at the Library or on The Friends website) or by purchasing a membership at the Library's Main Checkout Desk prior to 4:30 p.m. on Friday night. There will also be a membership sign-up table beginning at 5 p.m. on Friday night. *Memberships can also be obtained online with a PayPal account.* (*Must be done prior to Oct. 3 to attend the Friday night sale.*)

The sale is open to the public starting on Saturday, Oct. 4 from 9:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. Sunday, Oct. 5 is Bag Sale Day, which takes place from 1:00 to 4:00 p.m. We supply the bag; you fill it and pay \$10. Show your current Friends membership card and pay only \$7 per bag. For less than a whole bag, the books will be sold at half-price. All proceeds from the Book Sale benefit the Chester County Library.

THANK YOU, VOLUNTEERS!

In May, the Chester County Library and Henrietta Hankin Branch Library hosted a special luncheon at Bone Fish to celebrate the dedicated volunteers whose generous service plays a vital role in supporting library programs and operations. Approximately 60 attendees were honored for the impact of the libraries' 152 active volunteers, who collectively donated an impressive 11,198 hours in 2024.

Volunteers support the library in a wide variety of ways, from shelving books and assisting with events to helping in makerspaces and behind-the-scenes operations. Their contributions allow the library to extend its reach and maintain high-quality services for the community.

Among the many volunteers recognized, several individuals stood out for their extraordinary commitment. Four volunteers donated over 500 hours, and six exceeded the 1,000-hour mark.

A special recognition was given to **Theresa Hammond**, a Chester County Library Friends Board member, who has donated over **4,000 hours** of service over the years. In appreciation of her dedication, Hammond was presented with a commemorative clock.

In addition to celebrating volunteer contributions, the event acknowledged the ongoing support from the **Friends of the Chester County Library**. Our nonprofit organization funds numerous library initiatives, including staff appreciation events like this luncheon, professional development opportunities, furniture and equipment upgrades, essential resources for the libraries' makerspaces, and sponsorship of summer reading programs.
